SUMMER SHOW

With our show almost upon us I would like to highlight the schedule from 1925 that is attached on page seven.

Whilst we have two shows there was just an annual one on a strange bank holiday date that we don't have now.

Many categories are similar to what we have today – 89 years later and some have fallen by the wayside. Carnations are not widely grown now (apart from Geoff Smith who is growing some from his 93 year old Dad's stock) and I am intrigued by the term heaviest potatoes – does this mean main crop or was it literally the biggest spuds you could find?

With a wider range of vegetables available now we feature garlic and asparagus, which would not have been heard of in 1925 unless you were one of the travelling elite. I am surprised by the absence of rhubarb – I thought everyone grew that, and radishes as well.

The 'Domestic' section featured more pickles than anything else and you weren't allowed to make a sponge cake!

Back to the present

Jackie (Chair) and I have updated the schedule to take out some of the categories which have had no entries in the last few years and have added a few new ones – such as a fragrant rose in the flower section and salad vegetables in the vegetables section.

We have added to the novice section and hope that there will be

lots of new faces taking part in the show as we have had an influx of new and very keen plot holders.

There is plenty of advice at hand to help those who have never entered a show before. Go on - have a go.

The children's class has been updated to include a colour picture of a fruit, made from whatever takes their fancy. We hope to have a beautiful display again from pupils at Granard School.

Have a look at the competition – as the photograph has been very popular we are extending this to under 16's to give them a chance to show off what they can do. We have stolen an idea from another show - a flower display in a teapot and expect to see an array of dusted off teapots of all shapes and sizes. Remember – there is a £10 prize for the winner of each of the three categories.

There will be a bottle/jar tombola as usual and we will be raffling a hamper full of homegrown and homemade produce.

We have also updated the cups so that they are more fairly distributed. There will be a cup for the best novice in each show and one for the child who has the most entries over both shows.

SAVE THE FARM TERRACE ALLOTMENT CAMPAIGN Breaking News - date fixed!!!

The Members of the SAVE THE FARM TERRACE ALLOTMENT

The Campaign in Watford, Herts have been given the date of their hearing at the Royal Courts of Justice, Westminster to decide if they can keep their allotments:

Friday 25th July 2014

The Judge will decide if the Secretary of State, Eric Pickles acted unlawfully in granting Watford Council permission to take back the allotments for building purposes. thus flouting all Allotment Laws!

The Court has designated the case 'significant' and we know why....this is a landmark case and a victory for the Watford Allotments will be a victory for allotments throughout the land!

Support has been pouring in for them and recently articles have appeared in National Newspapers. highlighting the case. Their Campaign Fund is now at £11,540.00, raised by 584 people in 10 months, and their goal is £30,000! The Solicitors Deighton Pierce Glynn are representing the Claimants, the Farm Terrace Allotments, and they will be joined by QCs from King's Bench Walk for the Court Case. People from all walks of life are donating and supporting their cause, a few days ago Justin Sullivan from the British Rock Group, the New Model Army donated and wrote an excellent piece for their website!

JUNE RECIPE

Based on a recipe by Paul Rankin

Tagliatelle with tomatoes. chilli, pancetta, broad beans and basil (for 2)

1 onion, chopped
1 tablespoon olive oil
6 rashers of pancetta or lean
streaky bacon
1 clove garlic, chopped
110g (4oz) cherry tomatoes
(halved)
half a small green or red chill –
according to taste (finely chopped)
or pinch dried flakes
Salt and ground black pepper
60g (2oz) small broad beans,
shelled and blanched in boiling
water
1 large handful of chopped basil
200g (6oz) tagliatelle

- Heat the oil in a pan and sauté the onion and bacon till onion softened and bacon crispy.
- 2. Put tagliatelle into boiling salted water and simmer for 8-10 minutes.
- 3. Add chilli, salt and pepper and tomatoes and simmer for 3-4 minutes.
- Add broad beans and basil and cook for a further 2-3 minutes.
- 5. Drain the tagliatelle and serve sauce on top. Grate on some Parmesan cheese.
- 6. Serve with a green salad.
