CHAIRS REPORT

The growing season has started and we have lots of green shoots on our plots and in our gardens. The store has been very busy already, with our members browsing the seeds (so tempting!) and buying potatoes, onions and fertilisers. The water will be turned on again as soon as there are no frosts forecast.

We also have our plot inspections on 10th and 11th March (please see article later in Bulletin) and ask that if you are giving up you let us know now so we can arrange for your plot to be let to one of the 200+ people on the waiting list in time for a good start to the season and before rent collection in April.

I have little new to report on our Charity status. Our main concern is that any new lease with Wandsworth is acceptable to the Charities Commission. We are working on this with the help of Cllr Ian Lewer.

Please let me know if you would like to come and hear our Guest Speaker, Paul Ellis-Howe on Sunday 13th March. Paul is the Best Plot Judge (Wandsworth) so you may have a lot of questions for him. He will be at the Store from 12 noon. As you know there isn't much room in the store so we need numbers and questions beforehand if possible. Thank you.

STORE REPORT

This is the month to finish your soil preparation ready for planting. We had a large delivery of Country Natural last week so, if you did not mulch your plot with manure towards the end of last year, you can dig in and plant immediately with Country Natural.

Now is the time to look at the packets of Kings Seeds sold in the Store at a 20% discount and start planting your seeds for this year's crops. Our Deep Root Trainers are excellent for starting off your seeds and cost £4 for 32 cells. We have plenty of John Innes Seed and Cutting Compost sold in 20 litre bags at £4.00 and Vermiculite sold loose at £2 a kilo.

We still have potatoes on sale at the Store at £2 per kilo. Once they have finished chitting, wait until the soil has warmed up, after a few days of sunshine, and put 5 cms/2" of organic matter over the area before you plant them.

Our onions and shallots are selling well at £1.50 a kilo or 75p for 500 gms. A good way to start the onions off is in small pots. Plant 4 onions in a 3" pot of multi-purpose compost and lightly water. Plant out at the end of March/early April when they have started to sprout putting the whole clump in the ground. If you have several pots, plant these 4"–6" apart.

At this time of year it is a good idea to clean up after winter and deal with disease and pest control. We sell Armillatox, although not licensed as a pesticide can be used to clean, sterilise and disinfect greenhouses, pots, patios and stone paths. Dilute 50 ml in 5 litres of water at an application rate of 1 litre per square meter. We also have Vitax Winter Wash, which is based on natural plant and fish oils designed to destroy overwintering pests and their eggs on fruit trees and bushes. Mix 50 ml per litre of water and apply as a fine spray during calm and dry conditions covering all the bark surfaces and crooks of branches and stems. This should be done straight away.

MARCH PLOT INSPECTIONS

The next plot inspections will be carried out on Thursday 10th and Friday 11th March. At this time of year the team is looking for a start of cultivation, before the rents are due on 1 April. Weeds should have been removed and at least 60 % of the plot area should either be ready for planting, have been planted with the first crops of the year or have viable crops left over from the winter. Soft fruit should have been pruned. The team expects to see plenty of clear bare ground although broad beans and peas might be visible. Paths around a plot should have been tamed and made safe to walk on. Please have your plot correctly numbered. Replacement plot numbers and labels are available free of charge at the store

If your plot has been badly neglected, we may not accept your rent and you risk losing your plot.

If you have been unable to work your plot due to illness or other reasons please let us know. For site 2 contact Georgina O'Reilly and for site 3 Helen Finch (see below for details).

We will contact you individually after the inspection if essential work needs to be done.

Paul Klee (1879-1940) Flower Bed, 1913 Oil on cardboard

Plants and gardens deeply fascinated Klee from an early age. Scholars estimate that he devoted around a tenth of his oeuvre, about 10,000 works in all, to plant imagery. Klee expressed his affinity for gardens in a letter to his fiancée, Lily:

'My mind is clearest and freshest, and I often experience the most captivating moods, even moments of great joy, when I am tending plants in my garden, making cuttings, potting, binding, pruning, transplanting, separating, etc., and when I feel like a plant myself.'

WORKING FOR THE BROWNIES GARDENING BADGE: BY SALLY BAKER



Hi, my name is Sally Baker, I am 9 years old, and I like to help my mum out on her allotment, plot number 43a. (site 2)

I have been a member of the 1st Barnes Brownies since October 2014 and this year I am hoping to get my Gardener Badge.

To get my badge I will need to

- 1. Explain how and why you keep your garden tidy and free from weeds.
- 2. Grow four kinds of fruits, vegetables, herbs or annual flowers from seeds or bulbs. Transplant the seedlings then tend and train them as necessary.
- 3. Do all the following:

Show which tools you need to care for your garden and how to keep them in good condition.

- Know the dangers of tools left lying around.
- Know the dangers of garden products such as weed killers.
- 4. Know how the following affect your garden.
 - Light and shade.
 - Temperature and weather conditions.
 - Soil types.

As we go through the grow seasons I would like to keep you up to date on how my badge is going, with a write up and some photos of what I am growing and how it is all going. Hopefully I will be able to get my Gardener Badge at the end of the growing season to show you all.

This month I have been helping my mum to choose the seeds we would like to grow, and our crop growing plan, all ready for next month when I can start to sow some of my seeds indoors.

The four vegetables I would like to grow are leeks, onions, potatoes and carrots. The four fruits I would like to grow are melons, strawberries, apples and pears. (I am growing dwarf apple tree and dwarf pear trees in large pots). Finally the four herbs I would like to grow are sweet basil, garlic chives, mint and parsley. Until next month happy sowing.

MARCH RECIPE

Quinces are in fashion! Recently, I have seen several recipes for quinces. I have just made this cheese with quinces from my garden. I got the recipe from the River Cottage site, so many thanks to Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall.

The Quince Cheese needs to mature for 4-6 weeks before using and will last for about a year.

It has a delicious lemony scent and sweet/sharp taste, and is an excellent accompaniment with cheese.

QUINCE CHEESE

Quinces Sugar

Wash the quinces well. Roughly chop them and put them into a pan and just cover with water.

Bring to the boil, and then simmer until soft and pulpy. Leave to stand for several hours.

Rub the quince pulp through a sieve or pass through a mouli. Weigh the pulp and return to the pan. I weighed the pan, then weighed it again with the sieved pulp in it. Add to the pan an equal weight of sugar.

Bring slowly to the boil, stirring until the sugar has dissolved, then simmer gently, stirring frequently, to prevent burning, until the mixture is thick and glossy.

This takes an hour to an hour and a quarter. The mixture is ready when it is so thick you can scrape a spoon through it and see the bottom of the pan for a couple of seconds before the mixture oozes together again.

The mixture gets very thick and bubbles and spits, so take care!

You can keep it in a number of ways.

- 1. Pour into small dishes that have been brushed with glycerine, to help them come out easily. Cover with a layer of greaseproof paper and cling film and store in the fridge.
- 2. Pour into a shallow baking tray lined with greaseproof paper. Also cover with greaseproof paper and cling film.
- 3. Pour into small, sterilised jars. Seal open jars with melted food-grade paraffin wax and lids.

Serving Quince Cheese

1. Slice and serve with cheese.

- 2. Cut into cubes and toss in sugar as a sweetmeat.
- 3. Roughly chop a little and add to a lamb casserole, taglines.
- 4. Add a little to stewed apples or pears for a pie or crumble.
