PLOT INSPECTIONS

The next plot inspections will be in mid-November. The inspection team usually consists of at least three Committee members (the Site Manager and the two Site Secretaries), and one non-Committee member.

What the team would expect to see in November is:

- That the plot has been tidied up for the winter
- That weeds are under control and particularly not left for seeds to blow on to neighbouring plots
- That surrounding paths are not obstructed

If the inspection team identifies a problem the plot holder will be contacted. The aim is to give guidance and encouragement but if

there have been problems in the past the team will know as records of previous shortcomings in cultivation have been kept. The team is mindful that there is a long Waiting List and we do have an obligation to those patiently waiting for a plot.

Quite a number of plots have lost their labels so some of these will be put in place ready for the inspection. Please do not move them, as they will have been positioned to help make the plot inspection go more smoothly.

Please let us know if there are any particular circumstances (e.g. illness or injury) that have prevented you from looking after your plot.

Bindweed

The only way to weaken bindweed is to be vigilant and keep removing the top growth when you see it and also dig out the roots. When

digging take out any white roots you find.

The Store is stocking *Bayer* 'Tree Stump, Bramble and Weed killer'. This is a biodegradable product that is a systemic, thus destroying the roots and not remaining in the soil.

Tomato Blight!

Were you lucky this year and managed to escape the blight?

I have given up growing tomatoes on my plot, after several disappointments with tomato blight and now grow tomatoes in pots against a wall in my garden, with plenty of space around them.

I remembered Alys Fowler had written about this in 'The Guardian' (links below) so I am sharing some of her ideas.

The problem is our warm, wet climate. Tomato blight is an airborne fungal disease that affects the whole plant. It starts in June after warm rain! The first signs are the dark patches on the stems that quickly work their way up to the fruit.

The most important thing to do is to destroy the plants, black bin liner, and then burning is best. Do not put them on the compost of your compost will become infected, as the spores over-winter and the cycle starts again.

Alys recommends use of a greenhouse to help prevent the problem.

In October this year someone wrote to Alys at 'The Guardian' about having tomato blight in her greenhouse. She said she had tried various chemicals but Alys replied that hot water and a scrubbing brush was as good as you cannot stop blight just try and avoid it.

She said, "There is some anecdotal evidence that a solution of 50/50 milk and water sprayed weekly helps to keep the spores at bay". Also to strengthen plant feed them weekly with comfrey or liquid seaweed.

Alys also recommends growing some new varieties of tomatoes, such Ferline and Legend F1 cordons as they are early fruiting so you may miss the blight. Also Matt's Wild Cherry and Koralik show signs of resistance.

NOVEMBER RECIPES

There are two recipes this month, both thanks to Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall.

I grew sweet potatoes this year for the first time and, as I am a great breakfast fan, like this recipe, as they make a delicious weekend breakfast. The second uses butternut squash if you have a glut.

Sweet Potato Pancakes

180g plain flour
3 tsp baking powder
½ tsp nutmeg
½ tsp ground ginger
Pinch salt
300g cooked sweet potato, mashed
2 eggs, lightly beaten
60g butter, melted and cooled
slightly, plus a little more for frying.
Butter, honey & toasted walnuts

- 1. Sift the flour, baking powder and spices into a bowl.
- 2. In a separate bowl beat together the sweet potato, eggs and butter.
- 3. Fold all above ingredients together. The batter will be quite stiff.
- 4. Heat a frying pan and melt the butter in it. Drop tablespoons of the batter into the pan, shaping them into rounds.
- 5. Fry for 4 minutes on each side until browned on both sides.
- Spread with butter, trickle on honey and sprinkle on the walnuts.
- 7. Alternately, they are good with maple syrup and crispy bacon.

Butternut Squash Curry

4 tbsp sunflower oil
3 onions, peeled, halved and thinly sliced
Salt & freshly ground black pepper
4 garlic cloves, peeled and thinly sliced
2 tsp finely grated fresh ginger

1 small green chilli, halved, deseeded and thinly sliced 2 tsp ground coriander 2 tsp ground cumin 2 tsp garam masala 1 butternut squash, peeled. Deseeded & cut into 2 cm chunks 100g red lentils, rinsed 700ml vegetable stock 400g tinned plum tomatoes 1 big handful of fresh coriander, tough stalks removed, leaves chopped

- Heat the oil in a large saucepan and sauté the onions with a pinch salt until softened, stirring frequently with a wooden spoon. This will take about 15 minutes.
- 2. Add garlic, ginger, and green chilli and cook, stirring for a further 5 minutes.
- Add ground coriander, cumin and garam masala, stirring them well in.
- 4. Then add squash cubes and lentils and stir until well coated.
- 5. Pour in stock and tomatoes, breaking them down with the wooden spoon.
- 6. Simmer, part covered with the lid until the squash and lentils are very tender. Approximately 30 minutes.
- 7. Stir in 2/3 of the fresh coriander and check seasoning.
- 8. Serve with basmati rice and some thick yogurt and toss the rest of the coriander on top.

I sometimes throw in a couple of handfuls of washed spinach leaves 5 minutes before the end as this adds to the colour and flavour.
