CHAIR'S REPORT NOVEMBER 2016

Last year the Fire Brigade was called to both sites and we really must avoid this happening again this year or we will be banned from having any fires ever again!

On Wednesday 23 November we are holding our Annual General Meeting and Committee Elections at St Margaret's Church Hall in Putney Park Lane (where we hold our Shows). Light refreshments from 6.30 pm then the business will start at 7pm. This will be followed by the presentation of Cups and the offer of more substantial refreshments and a chance to chat to committee members and your fellow plot holders.

PLOT INSPECTIONS

The next plot inspections will be in early November. The inspection team usually consists of at least three Committee members (the Site Manager and the two Site Secretaries), and one non-Committee member

What the team would expect to see in November is:

- That the plot has been tidied up for the winter so there would be quite a lot of bare ground.
- That weeds are under control and particularly not likely to invade any neighbouring plots either by sending out runners or by spreading seeds.
- That surrounding paths are not obstructed and are reasonably well maintained.

If the inspection team identifies a problem the plot holder will be contacted. The aim is to give guidance and encouragement but if there have been problems with cultivation in the past the team will take this into account. We are mindful that there is a lengthening Waiting List and since allotments are a public facility in high demand and short supply we have a responsibility to ensure plots are well used.

Please let us know if there are any particular circumstances (e.g. illness or injury) that have prevented you from looking after your plot.

HEDGEHOGS

Hedgehogs are found across the UK, absent only from some of the Scottish Islands.

They eat slugs and snails, but also beetles, earthworms and caterpillars.

Young are born from May onwards in litters of up to five and the young leave the nest after 4 weeks. They live for 2-3 years.

Hedgehogs, along with dormice and bats hibernate, or enter a state of torpor from October/November, lowering their body temperature and slowing their metabolism to save energy. They must feed intensively to be in good condition before hibernating.

The NSALG stresses the importance of tidying up allotments and removing any old crops in preparation for next year. Remains of summer crops may harbour overwintering pests and diseases.


They also suggest collecting fallen leaves and making a leaf mould stack and cleaning and checking garden tools and equipment.

NOVEMBER RECIPE

(Thanks to Louise Hagger in The Guardian on 13 August 2016)

Courgette and Chard Tart

2 red onions, peeled & finely chopped Olive oil 500g courgettes A few sprigs thyme leaves, chopped ½ bunch Oregano, chopped 3-4 sheets Filo pastry 25g melted butter 200g rainbow Chard, stalks separated from the leaves. Slice the stalks and shed the leaves 2 eggs A few sprigs mint leaves, chopped 100g Parmesan cheese 1 unwaxed lemon 100g Feta cheese 100g black olives (de-stoned)

- 1. Preheat oven to 220C/gas 7. Grease a 24cm tin or ovenproof frying pan.
- 2. Put the olive oil and onions into a saucepan & fry on a medium heat for 5 mins.
- 3. Peel and roughly grate all the courgettes but one. Added the grated courgette to the onions with the thyme leaves & oregano & cook for 5-10 mins until mixture is dry.
- 4. Unwrap the sheets of filo pastry & lay them one by one over the pan, brushing each sheet with a little melted butter before you layer. Leave a little pastry to overlap the edges (you fold this in later). You need 3-4 layers all over. You may need to patch. Slice the remaining courgette into thin slices.

- 5. When the courgettes are ready add the chard stalks & fry for a few minutes further. Then put the mixture into a bowl to cool. Crack the eggs into a bowl; add the chopped mint & grated Parmesan cheese. Season with salt & black pepper and mix well together. Toss the shredded chard leaves in the juice & zest of the lemon & a little oil.
- 6. Mix the cooled courgette mix into the egg mixture & pour on top of the pastry layers, sprinkle on the shredded chard leaves & top with the courgette rings. Press down & dot with feta cheese & black olives. Fold the excess pastry over the filling to make wavy lines.
- 7. Bake in the bottom of the oven for 20-25 mins until golden. Serve with a well-dressed green salad.

COMPANION PLANTING

When planning your growing for next year think about companion planting to help with providing nutrients for the soil and pest control.

Plant combinations

- French marigolds among tomatoes to help repel greenfly and blackfly.
- Sage with carrot or plants in the cabbage family to ward off pests.
- Nasturtiums with cabbages as they are a magnet for caterpillars.
- Garlic planted among roses will ward off aphids.
- Carrots and leeks planted together helps with carrot fly.
