Winter Cultivation

An efficient plot will have some cultivation over the winter. Ideal crops to have over-wintering – apart from your brassicas – are broad beans, onions and garlic.

Broad bean seeds from King's are available in the store already and we will soon be receiving a delivery of onions for autumn planting. There will be a choice of Winter Red and Shakespeare (White), once again they will be sold individually and by the kilo.

In October we will receive delivery of 4 different types of garlic. These will be sold by the bulb that will normally have 12 – 15 cloves, each of which will develop into a bulb. Plant in early December and they will be ready to harvest in May and June.

Sacred Heart School Visit the Allotments

Following a preliminary meeting with their teacher, Bridget Hornblow, a visit was planned that focused on identifying nearly 30 types of fruit and vegetable plants and considering which part of the plant was edible. Children then dug potatoes and harvested strawberries and finally had a snack of strawberries and chocolate biscuits in the store.

38 Degrees have protected the Bees again

In the May 2013 Bulletin I wrote about the lobby of Parliament to encourage them to sign up to a EU ban on use of insecticides that are harming bees. 2,625,966 people signed the petition that was handed into Downing Street.

The Government did not sign up but the to EU did so there was a ban. However *Syngenta*, the manufacturer of the insecticide made an application for its use in Britain.

On 3 July *Syngenta* withdrew their controversial application to allow

their banned bee-killer pesticides back on UK fields, after an effective Campaign led by 38 Degrees. Their press release stated that:

"Owen Paterson, the environment minister, sided with Syngenta. But the decision was deemed so toxic that it was brought all the way up to the Prime Minister and his cabinet to discuss.

The day before the big meeting, the huge people-powered petition signed by over 200,000 of us was delivered to the PM's desk. And on the morning of the meeting, hundreds of us swarmed on Downing St to confront the ministers as they arrived. Dressed as bee-keepers, bees and pesticides, and with a host of other campaign organisations we chanted at the top of our voices and left the ministers in no doubt that we expected them to put our bees before Syngenta's profits.

And it worked! The government stalled and didn't announce a decision, forcing Syngenta to back down."

September Recipe

This is a seasonal recipe using up the cougettes and tomatoes. The quantity will serve 2 as main course or 4 as a starter

Courgette and Tomato au gratin

4 medium courgettes, sliced
I onion
2 tablespoons olive oil
4 large tomatoes, peeled and sliced
A large clove of garlic
A level teaspoon freshly chopped

4 level tablespoons of Parmesan cheese

125g (4 oz) cheddar cheese

Oven at Gas 5 or 400°C

oregano

- 1. Pour boiling water over the tomatoes and leave for a few minutes so the skins can be removed easily.
- 2. Sauté the onion and garlic then brown the courgettes.
- 3. Meanwhile drain the tomatoes and put into cold water so you can handle the tomatoes to remove the skins.
- 4. Grease an ovenproof dish and then layer in the courgettes, onion, garlic, oregano, Parmesan cheese and tomatoes.
- 5. Sprinkle the grated cheddar on top.
- 6. Bake for 25/30 minutes till golden and serve with crusty bread and a green salad.
