CHAIR'S REPORT JUNE 2015



This May we had a taste of all the seasons, most notably those strong winds early in the month. The Country Natural storage shed on site 3 was tossed onto Bob Aveling's plot. Thank you Bob for being so understanding about the damage! (See picture above.

Please remember the RULES regarding watering. We are **not allowed to use sprinklers** and hosepipes give way to watering cans where necessary.

Thefts. A few sheds were broken into on both sites over 2 weekends and the police were involved. At the same time there was a spate of thefts on the Dover House Estate. The thieves didn't enter through the gates but please lock them behind you at all times (even if you are just popping for a few minutes). An open gate is an invitation to strangers.

As from October (following final confirmation) the Wandsworth allotments service will transfer to a staff mutual (maybe a Charity) entitled 'Enable Leisure and

Culture'. We are convinced that the best way forward for the RGS is to become a Charity ourselves and secure a long lease on the land as soon as possible. To that end we have engaged the services of Russell Cooke, who have given us much "pro bono" advice, and they are helping us with our resubmission to the Charities Commission. We were looking at how many of our members volunteer and about 100 of you do! This is terrific support, thank you. If you would like to help in any way please let me know. There will be plenty of opportunities at the Show, as Carol explains in her article.

SUMMER SHOW

The schedule for the show on Saturday 20th June comes with this bulletin. Please have a look to see what you can enter – there are a few changes, mainly in the cookery section.

Working with our new cookery judge Helen Saberi we have added a dish featuring strawberries that, of course will be abundant. The dish is up to you – it can be an old family favourite or something new you think you will try on the day. The cookery dishes do not have to use home grown ingredients although obviously they are often tastier than shop bought.

We have also added 'speciality' bread to the bread class as many people are now having a go at making focaccia or ciabatta or similar.

The cake that has a given recipe is this year a lemon drizzle cake – where a few people are entering this category presentation will be especially important - as the taste should be similar

For the flower section we have bought some lovely new transparent acrylic vases to use instead of the old green metal ones. These will be available on the day for anyone entering the category for 3 or more kinds of cut flowers, the displays of which are usually large, colourful and splendid.

Novices are especially welcome to enter and there is a category for those who have not won a first prize in the show before. So even if you entered last year and did not get a first, you can still enter in this class and try for a first prize. There are plenty of people around on the morning of the show to help novices in choosing their best items (always take along a few more than are asked for in the class in case one gets squashed or broken on the way to the church hall), and advise how to best present them.

Lots of families have taken up plots recently and children have their own category as well. Please encourage your child to enter the show as everyone likes to see his or her little masterpieces. If they also enter the autumn show they are in with a chance of winning a prize cup to hold on to for a year.

Finally – we cannot run the show without volunteers and donations, so if you can help the evening before with moving tables (19th June, 5pm at the store on site 2) or on the day helping to clear away teacups please let me know via the website.

There is a donations box in the store for items suitable for the bottle tombola and a children's tombola. Please put your items in the box or bring them along to the church hall on the morning of the show.

STORE REPORT

First of all, a huge thank-you to Barbara McCall for passing over everything to me in such good order. She will be a hard act to follow.

We all dread **slugs**, especially at this time of year. It is heart breaking to see the tender plants that we have lovingly grown from seed disappear almost overnight by these slimy pests.

There are several ways of attempting to control them. In the Store we stock **Advanced Slug Killer** pellets from Growing Success, that contain ferric phosphate, which is less harmful to wildlife than those laced with metaldehyde. We also stock **copper tape** which reacts with slime causing a flow of electricity that send the slugs away. We are trialling **Slug Stop**, non-toxic granules that provide a physical barrier around the plants. It has a superior absorbency action that

extracts the moisture from slugs and snails that they need to survive. You pour Slug Stop around individual plans to create a barrier 2cm wide and 0.5cm deep.

Another approach is to use **Nematodes**, e.g. Nemaslug, which have no adverse effect on other types of animals. These nematodes are watered into moist soils, then enter their bodies and infect the slugs with bacteria that kill them. These need to be stored in a fridge so we have decided not to stock them in the Store, but they are available on the internet or can be found in garden centres.

If you want your slugs to die happy, you can try a **beer trap**, or sink a saucer of beer into the ground near the plants that need protecting. This will need topping up regularly and may get diluted by rain.

Apparently, one in five gardeners admit to throwing slugs and snails into their neighbour's gardens. Obviously, we do not recommend this on our allotments!

We now have **Hozelock tap connectors** in stock for when you lose your one, and we will be getting some **Hoselock spray attachments** shortly.

THEFTS

During the night of 2nd May 3 separate sheds on site 3 were broken into. A pair of bolt cutters was stolen from one of these. During the night of Saturday 9th May thieves broke into Site2. This time, 16 sheds were broken into, in most cases by padlocks being cut open with bolt cutters. Four electric strimmers and a

garden fork were stolen. On both sites the gates were locked so the thieves obviously gained access over these or one of the boundary fences. The police were called on discovery of the extensive break-ins and thefts on site 2. If you have any information relating to this incident please contact the police and quote **Crime Reference Number 0309885/15.**

Should you be aware of anything suspicious on site please do not hesitate to contact the police on **999** in an emergency or **101** for non-emergency situations.

VISIT TO THE RECYCLING FACILITY

A small group visited the facility that collects black sacks and recycled rubbish from Wandsworth, Lambeth, Kensington & Chelsea and Hammersmith & Fulham Councils. 1000 tonnes of black sack rubbish is collected a day and transported in containers, on barges to Bexley riverside, where it is incinerated and the power used to make electricity. We also saw the recycled rubbish, that is collected in orange sacks (350 tonnes a day), sorted and compressed ready to be sent for recycling.

It is obviously important that we all recycle properly. One of the most frustrating things is the numbers of plastic bags that are recycled in orange sacks. These cannot be recycled by the facility and should be taken back to supermarkets. For more information about recycling:

JUNE RECIPE

Potato Salad with tarragon

900g new potatoes, washed and scrubbed and cooked in boiling salted water until just tender. If large slice or cube.

I tablespoon of fresh tarragon leaves, chopped

I bunch of spring onions, washed and chopped

2 tablespoons of cornichons, chopped

2 tablespoons of walnut pieces, browned in the oven (Gas 6/200° C for a few minutes to crisp. Them chopped

Place above ingredients in a bowl.

Dressing:

I tablespoon tarragon or cider vinegar

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

2 tablespoons olive oil

2 tablespoon walnut oil

1 teaspoon runny honey Salt & ground black pepper

Place dressing ingredients in a screw top jar. Screw on the lid tightly, and then shake well until ingredients are combined.

Pour dressing over the warm potatoes and serve or keep in a refrigerator.
