Store – SATURDAY OPENINGS!

We have decided to **open the store on Saturdays (from 9 -11) in March and April** this year as well as on Sundays (from 10 - 12) as usual. We hope this will allow those of you who cannot come on Sundays will be able to come on a Saturday and benefit from the wide range of horticultural goods offered there. (We will **not** be open on Wednesday evenings in April as we did in the past.)

Projects

The committee has been looking into 2 major improvement projects. The first is to evaluate whether we need to replace or repair the Store structure on Site 2 and the second is to obtain estimates for the renewal of the water system on site 3.

Rents and Membership Fees

These are due by end of March and you should have received your Invoice by now. (If you haven't, please let me know as soon as possible.) Details of how to pay are on the Invoice.

Charity/Lease renewal

Justine Greening (our local MP and President) has convened a meeting

scheduled for 21 March between us (RGS) and the Council, which she will attend, to discuss a way forward. We need to have a Lease that the Charities Commission will accept. If that is unachievable then we will have to look at alternative ways forward.

PLOT JOBS FOR MARCH

- Continue soil preparation by hoeing to suppress early weeds and cover with black landscape fabric/ weed suppressant or a thick layer of composted stable manure to warm the soil. Top- dress overwintering vegetables with a general fertilizer.
- Apply a general fertilizer to all areas required for early crops.
- To lessen the impact of brassica club root, raise the soil pH by adding lime to brassica beds. Some club root resistant varieties are available in store, *e.g.* Brussels sprouts Crispus, Cabbage Kilaton.
- Sow outdoors early cultivars of beetroot, broad beans, peas, early cultivars of lettuce, radish, early spinach, parsnips and turnips. Seeds available in store.
- Towards the end of the month early varieties of carrot can be sown. Sow

indoors or in the greenhouse Brussels sprouts, cabbage, celery, celeriac, early leeks and tomatoes, cucumbers, courgettes, peppers and chillies. *Seeds available in store.*

- Start herbs from seed. Sow dill, fennel, parsley and sorrel in plots to transplant later. *Herb seeds available in store.*
- Watch out for signs of damping off in seedlings and be careful not to overwater.
- Prune blueberries.
- Direct plant shallots and onion sets.
- By the end of March, if the weather is warming, plant first early potatoes when the shoots are 2cms long
- Plant asparagus crowns.
- Prepare trenches for runner beans with well-rotted manure and shredded paper at the base.
- Clean greenhouse panes to maximise light levels.
- Children can sow Candytuft, *available in store.*

STORE REPORT

There are lots of items that we sell in the Store to help you with the jobs on your allotment this month.

There are 1m x 10m rolls of Weed Suppressant at £7.50 per roll. This has a weight of 100g per square metre which makes this strong enough to act as a good ground cover that will last for several years. We will be ordering more in March.

We have several choices of general fertilisers to apply now which are sold loose:

Growmore (£1.00 per kilo) is a popular non-organic fertiliser. Apply every 4-6 weeks throughout the growing season from February to the end of October. Use as a top dressing, or as a base dressing, working it into the soil. During dry weather water before and after application.

Bonemeal (£1.00 per kilo). Fork into the soil before planting or apply under roots when planting out.

Fish, Blood and Bone (£1.00 per kilo). Apply as a top dressing to the soil surface and fork in well.

Seaweed Meal (£2.00 per kilo). Sprinkle onto you beds before planting or when plants need a boost. Add a few handfuls to your compost heap to add minerals and boost microorganisms. You can also add a handful to potting soil before planting seeds or when potting on.

Chicken Manure Pellets (£1.00 per kilo or £6.00 for an 8 kilo bucket). Apply in Spring as a base fertiliser when preparing your beds for planting. Apply an additional feed 3-4 weeks after planting.

Onion Fertiliser (£1.50 per kilo). Apply to your onions 3 weeks after planting and then continue with applications every 3-4 weeks.

Lime (£0.50 per kilo). Apply 4-6 weeks in Spring before planting brassicas.

Enviromesh. This is sold by the metre (£4.00 per metre, 3.6 m

wide). We are investigating stocking this in ready cut packs of differing lengths.

The Store will be open on Saturday's between 9 -11 am from 3 March to 28 April. Cake will only be available on Sunday's but you will be able to have a cup of tea or coffee.

GETTING MORE OUT OF YOUR ALLOTMENT PLOT: Report from the Enable/Wandsworth share and learn session on 4 February at Naturescope on Wandsworth Common for all Wandsworth plot holders.

The emphasis was on how an assessment (as part of the annual assessment scheme for awarding certificates of achievement also known as the Best Plot Competition) can help allotmenteers get the most out of their plots.

Paul Ellis Howe, who has judged plots on the Wandsworth sites over the last 4 years, spoke about the relevance of the guidelines for assessment which were drawn up to encourage best allotment practice. The guidelines, covering all aspects of good allotment practice, can be used by all as checklist, regardless of their interest in being formally assessed. Paul suggested that the criteria on the score sheet might be adapted tor each site. For Roehampton Allotments it might be appropriate to change the maximum marks for evidence of crops grown for summer and autumn supplies and for autumn and summer supplies so that the marks reflect the reality. Most people seem to grow for summer and autumn supplies. A copy of the guidelines and score sheet can be found on the RGS website.

Paul talked about the site in Redbridge where he has a 10-rod plot and is one of 170 potholders, each with a 10-rod plot. There are monthly plot inspections to ensure that plots are being cultivated and if there are signs that a plot is being neglected the plot holder has a month to put things right otherwise the plot is let to the next person on the waiting list. It is very much a case of use it or lose it.

One tip I picked up from the session was on preparing an area for growing potatoes. Spread rotted or semi-rotted compost over the designated area in February or early March. By the time the potatoes are planted the compost will have broken down further and will continue to do so as the potatoes grow in this enriched medium.

As for what will happen in 2018, assessments will take place in mid-July and plot holders will be asked to nominate their plots/to agree to their plots being nominated. If you are interested in having your plot assessed it is never too early to start thinking about what you might do to make your plot the best it can be.

STEEP DECLINE IN BUMBLEBEES LINKED TO FUNGICIDES

A new American study has identified common fungicides as the strongest factor linked to the steep decline in bumblebees. This surprising result has alarmed bee experts because fungicides target mould and mildews, not insects. The study was been reported in a number of scientific journals including the Royal Society.

Scientists have previously studied insecticides, such as

neonicotinoids, that are now nearly banned by the EU.

A spokesman for the conservation charity Buglife, said that the way humans are managing landscapes is putting huge pressure on bees.

It is worth looking at the National Allotment Society website. Below are some tips for supporting wildlife and ensuring a balanced ecosystem that will reduce pests and diseases and increase productivity on the allotment. Also a list of leaflets that can be downloaded from their website

Tips for a wildlife friendly plot

- Reduce or eliminate use of chemicals, use companion planting and physical removal to combat pests such as aphids, slugs and sawfly
- Create habitats for wildlife; bee-boxes, hedgehog homes, log and stone piles for invertebrates, toads and slow worms who will also inhabit a compost heap
- Plant late, mid-season and early blooming nectar rich flowers to attract pollinators and beneficial insects all year round
- Make a pond, keep it ice free in winter by floating a ball on the top and ensure that it is

safe for other plot-holders' children

• Feed birds through the winter and supply nesting boxes

HAMPTON COURT KITCHEN GARDEN

Hampton Court kitchen garden was first established for the court of William 111(1689-1702) and Mary 11 (1689-1694) to provide fresh fruit, vegetables and herbs for the royal familiy. There was a hugh variety of exotic fruit and vegetables grown, some in hot houses and fruit trees against a specially buit hollow brick wall to keep the trees warm.



There were six of these kitchen gardens.

The court left Hampton Court in 1760 and the gardens declined, being used by a commercial grower in the 1840's and then tirned to lawn and ornimental gardens in the 1920's.

Six years of refurbishment began in 2008 and one kitchen garden was opened by the Countess of Wessex in 2014.

The gardens have been laid out in the pattern depicted by John Rocques in 1936 and are growing many varieties from the 18/19th century.

There is free entry to the kitchen garden.

MARCH RECIPE

Root Vegetable Cous Cous

- 1 tablesp. olive oil 1 medium onion 1 tsp. ground cumin 1 tsp. ground coriander 1 tsp tumeric 1/4 tsp. chilli powder 1 dessertsp. plain flour ³/₄ litre vegetable stock 1 large carrot 1 parsnop 1 sweet potato small swede 1/2 cauliflower 200g tin of chopped tomatoes 200g tinned chickpeas fresh coriander 1 tabsp. runny honey salt and pepper Harissa paste
 - 1. Wah, peel and chop the vegetables into even sized pieces.
 - 2. Heat the oil in a pan and saute the onion till softened.
 - 3. Add the flour, then the stock, stirring all the time until it comes to the boil.
 - 4. Lower heat and add the chopped parsnip and carrots and cook for 10 minutes, then add the sweet potato and cook for another 5 minutes. Lastly add the cauliflower and cook for a further 5 minutes.
 - 5. Add the tomatoes and chickpeas, honey and seasoning. Cook over a gentle heat until warmed through.
 - Taste to adjust the seasoning. Then sprinkle chopped coriander over to serve.
 - 7. Serve with cous cous.
