PLOT NUMBERING

Please ensure your plot is clearly numbered and the label is not hidden under some plants!

You can make your own; have a look round and you will see some lovely creative designs or you could buy one in slate or metal from a garden centre.

Make sure it is large enough for the number to be seen clearly from the side path and it doesn't fade. You could also paint the number onto your shed.

Failing that, we have large white plastic ones with stick on numbers and letters that you can collect free in the Store. These will last you for several years.

THE SUMMER SHOW

The Beast from the East in March and a heat wave in April wreaked havoc on our crops – some didn't get started, others were late and then brought on too quickly. But on Saturday 16th June the Summer Show will go on with whatever we manage to harvest. I don't expect there will be any problems with the rhubarb though!

There are some new categories to look out for – in the flower section we have added:

A display of white, pink and blue flowers, any mix, can be 1 colour or all. Foliage allowed, excludes roses.

And

A miniature arrangement in a vessel measuring no more than.5 x 5 cm, e.g. an egg cup.

I look forward to the imagination running riot with both of these.

In the cookery section, we have added:

My 'favourite teatime treat'. Can be savoury or sweet, not mixed, on a plate no larger than 20cm. And

A summer pudding.

Once again, our cookery judge will be food historian and writer Helen Saberi who has just published a book 'Teatimes, A World Tour' and the new cookery category was her idea. She is very generously donating a copy of the book that, for this show only, will be awarded to the 'Best item of cookery'. She also hopes to be at the show to sell signed copies.

We always encourage novices to have a go at showing what they have grown. On the website, and available on the day there will be a list of guidelines on presenting everything at its best. There will also be show veterans on hand to advise on numbers of exhibits and to ensure that something has not been cut off your vegetable or flower that shouldn't have been.

Instead of a tombola for children we are going to have a change with a lucky dip – everyone will win a prize. The adult / bottle tombola will still be featured.

The produce stall will have an array of seedlings and plants and surplus crops plus homemade jams. For those who cannot get there on Sunday mornings we will be selling selected items from the store.

BETTER PLOTTING

To get the most out of your Allotment Plot you might like to refer to the guidelines for assessment of plots entered for the Best Plot competition (an assessment scheme originally run by Wandsworth Council for the awarding of certificates) which were drawn up to encourage good allotment practice. The guidelines cover all aspects of plot cultivation and can be used as a checklist. regardless of your interest in having your plots formally assessed. Paul Ellis-Howe, who has been assessing plots on the allotment sites in Wandsworth for the last 4 years, will do so again in 2018. He is always happy to meet plot-holders.

The guidelines and score sheet for the award of certificates of Endeavour, Merit and Excellence can be found on the Roehampton Allotments website www.roehamptonallotments.co.uk in a new section "Better Plotting" which will cover various aspects of plot cultivation, such as companion planting, and have links to sources of useful information on other websites.

The emphasis this year is on how an assessment of a plot can help the owner get the most out of it. So do not be shy but seriously consider putting your plot forward to be scored against the various assessment criteria. The score sheet has been adapted to reflect the reality that most plot holders on Sites 2 and 3 grow for summer and autumn supplies rather than for autumn and winter supplies.

The timetable for 2018 is:

Early June plot holders will be asked to nominate their plots or to agree to their plots being nominated for assessment.

By 30 June nominations from Sites 2 and 3 of Roehampton Allotments will be sent to enable leisure and culture.

16 July assessments will take place, starting at 8 am. You will have the opportunity to meet Paul, the assessor if your plot is one of those selected for assessment.

PLOT JOBS FOR JUNE

Continue to hand-weed or hoe regularly to keep on top of weeds. Dig deep to remove highly invasive bindweed as it appears.

Continue to mow or clip grass paths weekly.

If you have sown green manure, dig it in this month to fix the nitrogen in the soil.

Water potatoes well, for good-sized tubers and reduced problems with scab. (Remember to target-water, not spray, to avoid water wastage.) First, second and salad potatoes may be ready for harvesting. Tubers should be ready when plants begin to flower.

Water tomatoes regularly and evenly. Uneven watering can cause cracked fruit and blossom end rot. Regularly pinch out side-shoots on cordon tomatoes and tie in plants to supports.

Feed every 10-14 days with a liquid fertilizer, changing to a high potash

fertilizer once the first fruits begin to set.

Plant out sweet corn 16" apart in blocks, not rows, to aid wind pollination.

Continue planting out or direct-sow runner and French beans.

Direct-sow courgettes.

Sow radicchio in drills for autumn salad leaves.

Sow fennel and oriental greens such as mizuna and pak choi. June sowings reduce the risk of bolting.

Successionally, sow salads, rocket and basil etc every two to three weeks for continuous picking.

Make a late sowing of peas for an autumn crop.

Quick-germinating annuals, such as cosmos, that attract insect pollinators can still be sown. Sow wallflowers for next year.

Quick-maturing radishes or salad leaf crops can be sown between brassica rows. Ensure netting on brassicas is bird-proof.

Sow overwintering carrots such as Autumn King or Chantenay. Cover with insect-proof mesh to prevent carrot root fly.

Transplant pencil-thick leeks now into 6" deep holes. Cover with insect-proof mesh to prevent leek moth damage.

Plant out pumpkins, squashes in well-manured ground. Plant out outdoor cucumbers and peppers. Protect with fleece on cold nights.

In the greenhouse ensure adequate shading. Check

nighttime temperatures and close door on cold nights.

On hot days keep greenhouse temperatures down by using maximum ventilation and damp down greenhouse floors to increase humidity.

Keep fruit bushes well watered. (Target-water, not spray, to avoid water wastage.) Protect soft fruit from bird attack by netting securely and tie in new raspberry and blackberry canes.

Continue to check for sawfly larvae on gooseberries. Hand pick off.

On plum trees, after the 'June drop' of excess developing fruits, thin the fruits to prevent over laden branches breaking.

Continue to regularly harvest established asparagus – mid April to mid June. If asparagus growth is weak, apply a general fertilizer of fish, blood and bone.

And finally... please nurture and save any surplus seedlings and plants to donate to the produce stall at the Summer Show on Saturday 16th June.

STORE REPORT

We are now well into the growing season and we have lots of products in the Store to support this.

Slugs are very much around and there are several products available to deal with these. Slug Gone Wool Pellets (£5.00 for a 3.5 litre bag) have proved popular since we introduced them to the Store a couple of years ago and provide a natural, safe and organic way of deflecting slugs and snails from your plants.

The pellets are composed of 100% natural ingredients including phosphorous, nitrogen and potassium. The pellets should be placed around the plants in a 6"-8" diameter collar with the pellets touching and then watered well to ensure that the 2 pellets bind together. When slugs climb onto this barrier it irritates the slug's foot and causes it to go elsewhere. This barrier will stay in place for up to 12 months and will slowly biodegrade and break down.

Other products to deal with slugs are the Advanced Slug Killer Pellets (£6.00 for 575ml), Slug Stop Non-Toxic Granules (£4.50 for a 3 kilo box) and

Grazers Slug Snail Spray (£8.50).

We recently had a large delivery of 6' and 8' canes. Our supplier advised us that there has been a run on canes this season so it is good that we have these in stock as the next delivery is not due from China until the end of July.

Clover introduced a new packaging design for their Multi-Purpose Compost this spring. It is very colourful.



Our suppliers sent us a larger size with our last order than our usual one. These are 75 litres (£5.00). Our usual size is 60 litres (£4.50). It would be interesting to hear which is preferred as we can order either size in the future.

COURGETTE AND CARROT SOUP (2 elegant servings)

Simple, quick, no fat - unless you add sour cream at the end - the whizzed up courgette gives body and creaminess.

2 courgettes (1 green/pale green/striped and 1 yellow)
1 medium carrot
1 or 2 cloves new garlic
600 ml chicken or vegetable stock
Cumin + turmeric: a large pinch of each

Chopped coriander, parsley or dill to serve

+ Spoon of sour cream per bowl

Chop half the carrots and courgettes into chunks and add to simmering stock with garlic and spices and cook.

Cut the remaining carrots and courgettes into thin slices and add to vegetables in the saucepan when they are almost soft. The slices should be kept just tender.

Remove cooked vegetables, leaving slices behind, and blitz either in a blender or with a hand whizzer. Return to saucepan.

Reheat to a gentle boil and turn off.

Serve, dividing up sliced vegetables so that there are slices of each colour and they float atop, with the chosen herb and sour cream, if wanted.
